## Walking to Biking:

## The Potential impact of 100 Bicycles





School going children in these rural areas usually do a 2-4-hour roundtrip walk 10-15KM each direction to get to and from any school while carrying a school bag loaded with books. Bicycling reduces that time to 30 - 45 minutes, allowing them to attend school and have more time for schoolwork, play and household chores.

Compassion International partnered with World Bicycle Relief (WBR) to present 100 bicycles to 100 youth from three church partners in Makueni County: AIC Kiu, ACK Kavete and RGC Kavete. This initiative aims to support youth and children who spend more of their time walking than studying.

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Even though bicycles are necessary, they are often not attainable because available models frequently break down and are unaffordable to most youths enrolled in Compassion's program. WBR designed their rugged, versatile bicycle and community-based maintenance and repair model with rough rural terrain in mind.

The bicycles not only help the youths get to school. Student bicycle ownership means better access to food and water and a more reliable income for 9 - 12 additional individuals in their family circle.

Through this initiative and working with the Monitoring & Evaluation team, we hope to see improvements in school performance among our beneficiaries and more girls completing their education.

The partnership also involved the training of 3 local mechanics (two caregivers and youth) to set up bicycle repair businesses, where beneficiaries and the community at large can have their bicycles repaired at a fee.



It will create income for the trainees and ensure other interested youths can learn from them and gain the needed skills to set up their shops in future.

## **Habitat & Shelter**







Since the inception of IFC Mkongani many of its caregivers have been living in dilapidated structures. Housing is a basic need that every human being would endeavour to have.

n 2020, at a time that saw us supporting caregivers due to the economic impact of Covid-19, 20 caregivers decided to come together and make better homes for their families, using access to a Makiga Machine. They came up with a budget of items for their housing project.

They came up with a design for a two-roomed home constructed using 2,400 bricks. Each of the caregivers who received the Unconditional Direct Cash Transfers support contributed towards financing the project. They then started purchasing the murram (kifusi), cement and paying for the labour of the brickmaker.

They divided themselves into smaller groups to sieve murram, carry water and offload bricks at the worksite. They would start work early in the morning and leave in the evening. The brick-making process took four months to make 50,000 bricks.

After completing the brick-making, each caregiver listed whatever they could contribute towards the construction of the house. These included coconut trees for timber, iron sheets, water, labour, a land bank and food.

Compassion International facilitated the church partners ferrying of the bricks to the construction sites for the different homes. So far we have managed to build three two-roomed permanent houses.

#### Challenges

- Even though some caregivers have their resources (labour, water and palm trees for timber), the church no longer has the funds to facilitate the housing project since the resumption of project activities.
- 2. 5 caregivers are at an advanced age and cannot contribute to the project.
- 3. The caregivers spend most of their income to cater for their basic needs with little to spare for the project.

#### Conclusion

To reach our goal of completing the construction of the remaining homes will depend on external funding.

# Security During the Festive Holiday Season



Criminal trends indicate an upsurge each time we approach the festive season of Christmas. In recent months there have been several worrying reports of violent crime in different parts of the country. Some of the likely causes of the current criminal trajectory are the impact of the Covid-19 restrictions on the economy, competing Government expenditure priorities leaving more security needs going unresourced or under-resourced and violent gun-related crimes linked to terrorist activity.

#### Advice:

- Ensure that your residential security is adequate with multiple locking points on doors and well-locking windows. Maintain a sound key management system by not leaving keys on display and being easily accessible to strangers.
- 2. At all times maintain a high situational awareness of your surroundings, including residential neighborhood and household security behaviors. Always trust your instincts.
- 3. Maintain contact with local authorities and local media outlets and keep abreast of changes in your security environment.
- Know your neighbors and consider forming a "neighbourhood watch" where you look out for each other's homes and the neighbourhood.


- 5. Upon recognition that the building is under attack, use the Run-Hide-Fight protocol:
  - 5.1. **Run** If possible, seek shelter at a safe distance.
  - 5.2. **Hide** Lock all access points immediately, and household members should immediately move to a predetermined safe location in the home.
  - 5.3. **Fight** If confronted by a threat such as an armed attacker, household members should fight only as a last resort and only to preserve their life or the life of others.
- 6. During or after the incident, and only when safe to do so, contact the local police for a response.


