Acknowledgments

The year 2022 has been full of blessings, even as we dealt with the challenges that came our way.

We have had the privilege to work with our Frontline Church Partners across the country with whom we shared many of the same heartaches and victories - yet remained resolute in ensuring that every child is known, loved, and protected.

Throughout the year, we focused on several priorities essential to advancing our mission of 'Releasing children from poverty in Jesus' name.' Working closely with our 466 Frontline Church Partners, we supported over 136,000 babies, children, and youth across 31 counties to implement a holistic child and youth development program that addresses the unique needs of individual program participants and local issues. We are excited to have graduated 8,273 of our program participants during the year, having been disciplined and equipped with education, training, and life skills to engage as empowered citizens.

Working closely with our 466 church partners, we supported over 136,000 babies, children, and youth in 31 counties.



The current global food crisis, caused by extreme weather patterns, impacted over 4.2 million people in the North Eastern parts of Kenya and the Horn of Africa. It has directly impacted 196 of our Church partners in multiple ways. In response, we supported over 46,000 families with food packs, water, and cash transfers to cater to their immediate needs. The lingering effects of the Covid-19 pandemic and the ongoing Russia-Ukraine war led to rising inflation and poverty rates, further exacerbating the situation of people already facing food insecurity. Our response has been two-fold. In the short term, we are meeting the urgent nutrition needs of children and their families while working towards sustainable, long-term solutions to help them achieve food security and build resilience. We recognize it is a task that requires all hands on deck, and we are keen to leverage strategic partnerships.

Compassion International Kenya is grateful for the invaluable contribution made by our supporters, church partners, staff, and program participants (babies, children, and youth). We also acknowledge the contribution of key stakeholders, including the support from various government agencies and other strategic partners. We believe that together we will continue to advance the achievement of important life outcomes for the registered program participants and release them from poverty in Jesus' name.

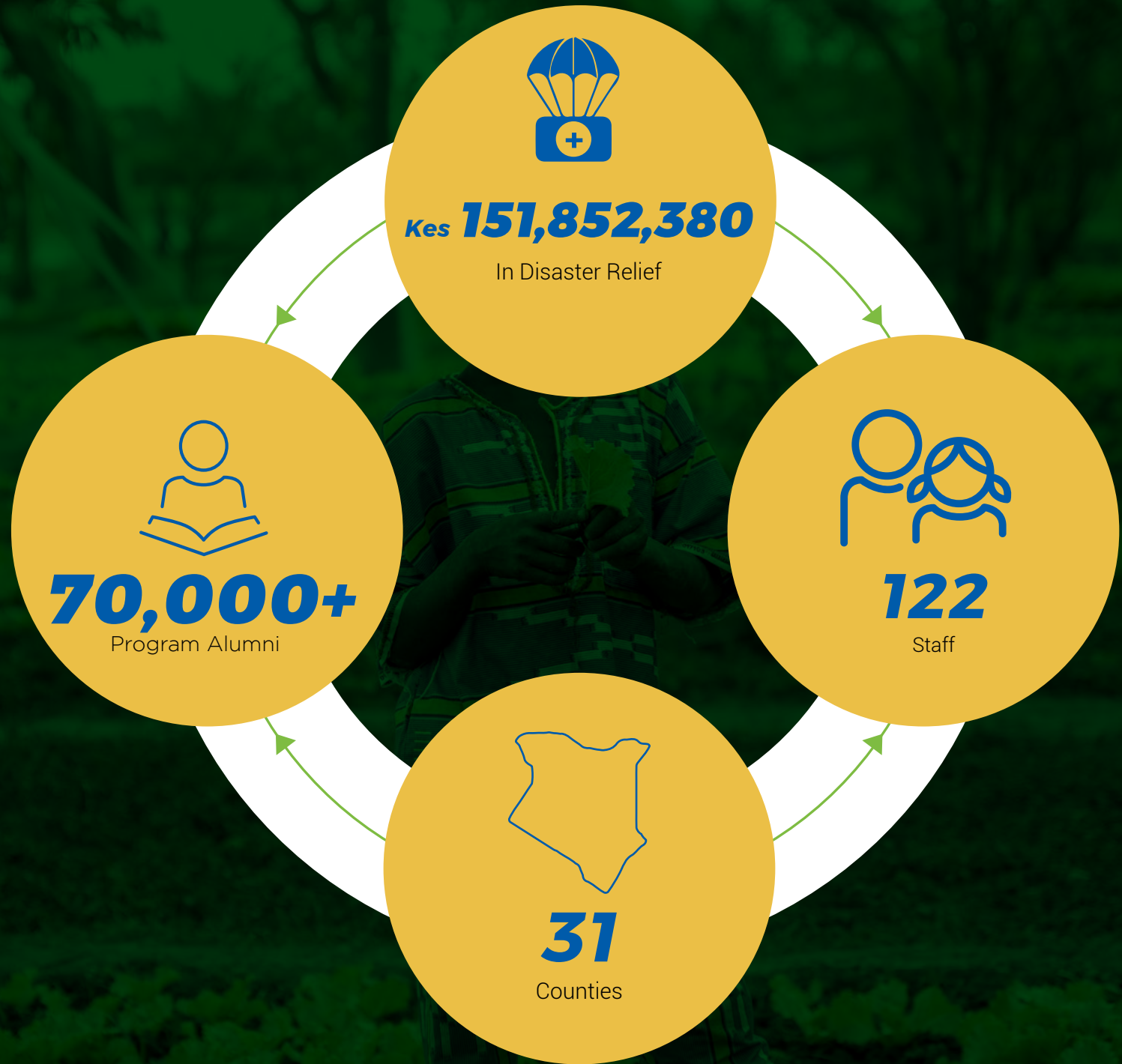

Protecting the African child

The Compassion team joined First Lady of Kajiado County Edna Chelangat Lenku, Hon. Rachel Shebesh, Chief Administrative Secretary (CAS), Ministry of Public Service, Gender, Senior Citizens Affairs & Special Programmes, Lady Justice Teresa Matheka, and several Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) for the national celebrations of the Day of the African Child in Kajiado County.

The stakeholders discussed proactive solutions against the harmful practices affecting the African Child. In line with the theme, "Eliminating Harmful Practices Affecting Children," it was a moment to reflect on the progress made in safeguarding children.

Compassion International Kenya believes in holistic care and child protection to help children fully develop into responsible and fulfilled adults. Sharing our experience as child protection advocates, we advocated for a commitment from all stakeholders to create an enabling environment for children to develop and thrive.

Child Protection and Safeguarding

Our work aims to ensure every child is protected from abuse and exploitation - every child must be known, loved, and protected.

Helping communities in their fight against Female Genital Mutilation (FGM)

In partnership with our Frontline Church Partners in Migori and Narok Counties, we have put in place a range of programs to drive FGM community sensitization training and the setting up of rescue centers. The long-term approach is to build relationships with communities enabling them to have effective behavior - change dialogue.

The work is to continually respond to every child protection issue ensuring all the children are protected and treated with dignity and respect. The key outcomes from our long-term collaborative approach:

- ➔ Access to justice for girls at risk of FGM or who have undergone FGM.
- ➔ Strengthened coordination and cooperation between different child protection bodies, such as the police, prosecutor's offices, and courts.

Food Security and Livelihoods Intervention

Amount introduced, in Oleopolos, Narok County for horticulture irrigation project to support farming among caregivers

Empowering communities with sustainable farming practices

In Oleopolos, Narok County, we introduced a Kes 4 million horticulture irrigation project to support farming among caregivers. The irrigation project incorporated solar-powered drip irrigation technology and smart farming techniques like Zai pits, sunken beds, and double-dug beds to maximize the yield.

Oleopolos experiences little rainfall throughout the year, leaving the community vulnerable. The caregivers face crop failure leading to frequent lack of food and water for consumption, agriculture, and livestock. In a collaborative effort Compassion International Kenya, the Narok County Agriculture Department, and the Kenya Agricultural & Livestock Research Organization (KALRO), organized the caregivers to benefit from technical training and practical implementation techniques.

The project also partnered with Davis & Shirtliff, who installed the solar water pumps and drip irrigation system. As a result, families have more control over their food production efforts as they are no longer only dependent on rainfall to farm. Besides food stability, caregivers have:

- 1) Increased their earnings by selling surplus at the market.
- 2) Reduced child abuse cases as caregivers can comfortably provide for their families.
- 3) Reduced school drop-out cases as alternative incomes are available.
- 4) Complemented livestock rearing, the mainstay of the community.

Five projects worth Kes 22,014,752 were funded targeting 1,901 program participants from 8 church partners in Laikipia, Machakos, Narok and Marsabit counties. The projects entailed:

- 1 Construction of 100,000 liters capacity underground water storage tanks at ACK Mugumo and A.I.C. Kyenzenzeni churches.
- 2 Construction of 10-door modern toilet facilities at ACK St. Paul's Erupata, GTIM Naiperere, and PCEA Faith Manguo CYDC churches.
- 3 Establishment of a biogas unit at Agape Sanctuary Ministries Nakuru.
- 4 Borehole drilling at AIC - Dirib Gombo church.
- 5 Borehole Drilling at ACK-Mogor church.

These projects aimed at enhancing sanitation as well as enabling access to portable water among targeted FCPs, program participants, their households and community members.







Health

Lowering the Malaria Burden Among Families

We remain committed to lowering the malaria burden among families, especially in malaria-endemic zones. We work to ensure sustainable malaria prevention measures that reduce the malaria burden and save lives. Our malaria intervention targeted 10,623 participants' households in 36 churches in Narok, Kakamega, Mombasa-Kilifi, Kwale, and Siaya-Kisumu counties.

Our intervention has helped:

- ➔ Move towards universal access to Long-Lasting Insecticidal Treated Mosquito Nets.
- ➔ Increased knowledge of malaria prevention.
- ➔ Reduce malaria incidents.
- ➔ Access to the proper treatment and adherence to the prescribed medicines.

Youth participants learn on how they could build a successful business

Empowering youth with entrepreneurship skills and mentorship

In July 2022, we launched the second edition of the Youth Business Challenge for our program participants. The challenge is recognizing the best business ideas, providing mentorship, and building peer cohorts supporting sustainable business growth. In the challenge, there were 103 applications of young participants who wanted to learn more about how they could develop their businesses toward success.

High unemployment and underemployment rates have forced the youth to innovate to sustain their livelihoods. Compassion aspires to empower our participants to thrive in their innovative solutions. The applicants were shortlisted into 20 participants, who presented their ideas to a panel that

selected the top three entrepreneurs who were awarded cash prizes.

Daniel, one of the participants, emerged victorious, taking home a mobile phone and Kes50,000.00 as seed capital to reinvest into his leather shoe manufacturing business. The second and third-placed winners received Kes.30,000.00 and Kes.20,000.00, respectively. The remaining top seventeen winners each received Kes.10,000.00.

We also partnered with Sote Hub and Sinapis through the Aspire Launchpad to offer post-event mentorship and incubation for all the young participating entrepreneurs. Much of our work at Compassion Kenya is to build innovators and problem solvers through mentorship and funding opportunities.
