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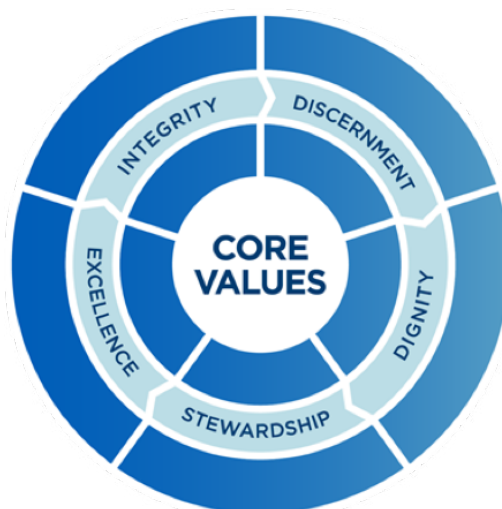

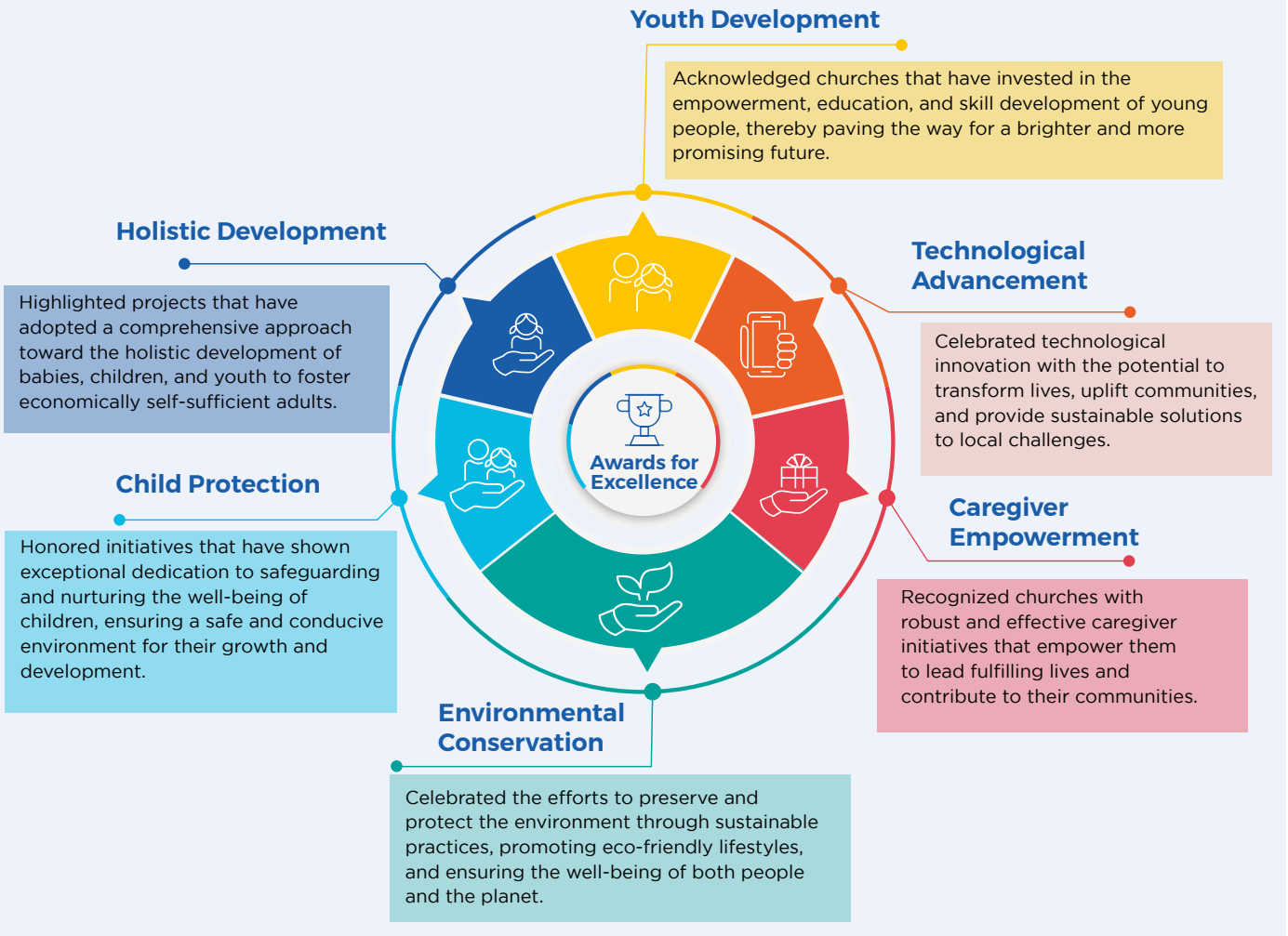
In a recent celebration of visionary leadership, innovation, and community-driven impact, the Partner of the Year Awards 2023 took place on August 23, 2023, at Elim Church in Mombasa County.

He extended his appreciation to Compassion and its church partners for their commendable efforts in various domains, including Child Protection, Holistic Development, Youth Development, Technological Advancement, Caregiver Empowerment, and Environmental Conservation. The Cabinet Secretary also underscored the need for responsible resource utilization to secure long-term prosperity.

On Wednesday, August 30, 2023, we celebrated and co-sponsored signing of the Hesabika Trust Code of Conduct and Governance Guidelines for the Church in Kenya at the All-Saints Cathedral. It is the first of its kind in Kenya and was developed by the Hesabika Trust to unite churches in matters of ethics and governance.

Compassion Partners with 460 churches in 31 Counties across Kenya to release children and youth out of economic, physical, spiritual, and social poverty. We believe in the need to ensure that our partners share in the belief that every child should be Known, loved and protected. The Code demonstrates that the Church can effectively and objectively self-regulate. The Code of Conduct and Governance Guidelines for the Church in Kenya covers core values, ethical responsibility and personal conduct for church leaders, the Church as an institution, and its congregation. It provides for the stewardship of church finances and other assets (savings and investments, fundraising, remuneration, tithes, and procurement). It has disciplinary and complaints handling, and dispute prevention and resolution procedures.

Churches that sign the Code demonstrate a commitment to good governance and conduct with their leadership and congregation and respect for internal and external resources.

They will need to build the internal capacity to adhere to the Code. It will support their Christ-centered capacity to uprelease the communities they serve, align with our mission, and make them more effective partners in our work to release children from poverty.

The development of the Code was driven by the need for the Church to model good governance and accountability, even as we demand the same from political and government leaders.

Compassion International Kenya endorses and supports the Code of Conduct and Governance Guidelines for the Church in Kenya because it promotes shared values of ethics and governance among churches.

This endorsement reinforces Compassion International's mission to release children out of poverty by ensuring its partner churches uphold ethical standards. Together, we will release every child and youth from poverty in Jesus' name.

Transforming Lives in Lokipetotakwaan, Turkana County

Life is full of diverse experiences, and bitterness was a familiar taste for the children of Lokipetotakwaan. Situated in Turkana County, this community faced the harsh reality of prolonged drought and food scarcity, forcing families to depend on pastoralism, wild berries, and relief food for survival. Amidst these challenges, Elim Church in Kakuma and its partnership with Compassion International sparked a transformative journey of change.

Lokipetotakwaan was a place where hardship was etched on the landscape. Families struggled to put a meal on the table, and water scarcity overshadowed their everyday lives. The children faced not only hunger but also the absence of necessities like clothing, shelter, and access to education.

In 2022, Compassion International Kenya partnered with Elim Church in Kakuma. The collaboration breathed new life into the community, focusing on empowering the most vulnerable members – the children. Through this partnership 180 children were welcomed into the Compassion program, beginning a transformative journey.

The leaders of Elim Church and program staff underwent comprehensive training, equipping them to lead the change within their community. Early in the partnership, a disaster fund was allocated, enabling the church to purchase meals for the children. This intervention provided immediate relief to households grappling with the bitter pangs of hunger. Health screenings and interventions, spiritual guidance, and hygiene education further solidified the comprehensive support the community received.

Education emerged as a central catalyst for change. Thanks to the collaborative efforts of Elim Church, Restoring Order Ministry (ROMI), and Compassion International, the community witnessed the creation of a foundation for learning.

Permanent classrooms, a well-furnished kitchen, a staff room, and a kindergarten section were established. Trained teachers and adequate learning resources replaced the former scarcity, igniting the flames of hope within the children's hearts.

Over the past three years, AIC Mwarangeni Frontline Church Partner has consistently organized shows and exhibitions in collaboration with the Kitui County Government through the Ministry of Agriculture. These events serve as a valuable forum where all 15 registered Community Savings and Loans (COSALO) groups, consisting of Compassion participants caregivers and youths, to demonstrate their diverse income-generating skills to potential stakeholders and investors. These shows and trade fairs have been pivotal in promoting and supporting the Church's activities within the local community.

Through collaboration between AIC Mwarangeni Church partner and the Kitui County government, these events have served as a platform for sharing knowledge about sustainable farming practices, enhanced livestock management, and various agricultural innovations with caregivers, youth, and

local farmers within the community.

Interactive demonstrations and workshops have enabled farmers to acquire contemporary techniques, utilize advanced technologies, and adopt best practices, resulting in increased agricultural productivity and culminating in the establishment of the Thagicu Arimi Co-operative Society Ltd. for the aggregation and marketing of green grams.

The collaboration between AIC Mwarangeni's and the Kitui County Government has had a transformative impact on the local community.

It has facilitated knowledge sharing, network building, and economic empowerment, all of which align with the shared goals of Compassion International Kenya and the AIC Mwarangeni Church in combating poverty.

Empowering Caregivers for a Brighter Future

At ACK Karangare in Embu County, Kenya, Frontline Church Partner has committed to empowering caregivers as catalysts against the cycle of poverty through partnerships with like-minded organizations that share our vision of community empowerment. Through home visits of Compassion participants, the church felt the need to further empower caregivers with the knowledge and skills to generate income and meet their family needs. In response, the church at a local level sought partnerships with Hand in Hand Kenya and Jirani Smart Ltd, organizations dedicated to community empowerment in Kenya.

Hand In Hand offers groups essential Income Generating Activity (IGA) skills and business training, while Jirani Smart provides startup capital to businesses without interest. The collaboration between organizations lasted for nine months from November 2022 to August 2023.

The collaboration kicked off with 15 groups, each consisting of 20 Compassion Participants caregivers, all registered with the Ministry of Labour and Social Protection. Over a period of nine months, these caregivers have undergone transformative training in various entrepreneurial skills, including group formation, savings, enterprise development, economic management, credit access, value chain/marketing, and climate change awareness, among others.

The impact of these training sessions has been profound. Caregivers have gained knowledge and harnessed their newfound skills to engage in income-generating activities such as soap making, baking, detergent production, tie and dye, bead necklace crafting, and much more. As the training program came to an end, it became clear that investing in caregiver empowerment and transformation through partnership can break the chains of poverty and pave the way for a brighter future. The various businesses that took shape during the program highlight the value of this approach.

Transforming Lives, One Home at a Time:

Eunice's Story of Hope

In Kenya, housing is considered a fundamental social and economic right for all citizens. The constitution guarantees every Kenyan the right to accessible and adequate housing, as well as reasonable standards of sanitation. Compassion Kenya as a supporter of the socio-economic development of the country through child development is actively working to ensure that children are protected even in their homes.

Eunice, a program participant, and her family of seven faced dire living conditions in a remote rural area. Their dwelling was a small, thatched mud house with leaking roofs and damp walls. A massive portion of their home had no roof, forcing the family to huddle in the remaining section, partially thatched with local palm fronds.

This makeshift arrangement provided little protection from changing weather conditions, leaving the children vulnerable to the harsh night cold. The overall living conditions were deplorable, severely impacting their health and well-being.

Unfortunately, financial constraints prevented them from improving their living situation.

Eunice's life took a hopeful turn with the introduction of the shelter improvement initiative by the Church Partners. The initiative aimed to revamp the family's housing conditions. Collaborating closely with the family, the church helped design a new house featuring three bedrooms and a spacious sitting room. The objective was to create a living space offering more room and better ventilation, contributing to improved health.

The results of the housing initiative were remarkable. The family now resides in a secure, comfortable house catering to their needs. With ample space for every family member to live and study. The new home has fostered an environment conducive to personal growth and well-being. The enhanced ventilation has had a discernible positive impact on their overall health, starkly contrasting their previous living conditions.

Eunice, and her family's journey from a substandard, dilapidated mud house to a safe and comfortable new home is a testament to the positive impact of shelter improvement initiatives in rural areas.

These programs are an integral part of Compassion's efforts to ensure sustainable communities for the children in their program. Beyond Eunice and her family, Compassion, with its Church partners, is committed to improving the living situations of its participants and their families.

Launch of Mental Health Strategy



After months of dedicated effort, 17 Kiambu-Nairobi Frontline Church Partners Mental Health Strategy launched on August 24, 2023, at PCEA Thogoto Church. This momentous event brought together various projects and stakeholders uniting in their shared commitment to addressing mental health challenges within the community.

The launch commenced with a spirited march from the venue to Alliance Junction and back. Participants donned white turtlenecks adorned with green ribbons, and with the slogan “Be Alert and of Sober Mind” The eye-catching theme, “Check-up from Neck up,” resonated with onlookers, emphasizing the importance of mental health awareness.

During the event, the Reverend from the host church shared wisdom from the book of 1 Kings 19:1-5, focusing on Elijah’s struggles to highlight the significance of addressing depression and investing in positive social networks.

The presence of the Mental Health Taskforce underscored the importance of creating a positive social network to engage a broader audience. The event attracted a diverse audience, including church leaders, chairpersons, community leaders, mental health representatives, youth representatives.

Several speeches highlighted key mental health insights, including the link between substance abuse and mental health, the importance of early diagnosis, and the role of psychiatry.

The strategy created in collaboration with mental health practitioners aims to promote good mental health and early intervention, specifically during childhood and adolescence. This approach is sustainable throughout life, equipping individuals to face challenges and reap long-term benefits. The strategy prioritizes family involvement in mental health and wellbeing, educating and raising awareness about the risks and consequences of drug and substance abuse, and improving outcomes for individuals with mental health problems through treatment and therapy.

Additionally, follow-up support and monitoring after treatment will be increased through social support and community involvement. Successful implementation of these priorities will require new ways of working. This successful event serves as a reminder of the urgent need to prioritize mental health awareness and support.

Compassion and NairoBits signed an MOU (Memorandum of Understanding) following the successful launch of a pilot class at PCEA Kariobangi, a church partner. The pilot program involved the training of 30 young program participants in the Digital Literacy Program. NairoBits Trust is a non-profit organization in Kenya that helps disadvantaged youth from informal settlements by empowering them with ICT skills.

Their programs provide digital skills training and professional integration with the labor market, enabling the youth to pursue successful careers in technology. NairoBits has impacted over 10,000 young people in Kenya, making technology accessible as a life-changing and solution-building tool for vulnerable youth.

Compassion International Kenya Alumnus of the Leadership Development Program recently organized an event at PCEA Kibra. The church had been vandalized during a local protest in the country, and the alumni dedicated a full day to spending time with the current child participants. During the event, they taught, played, and danced with the children in the program. Additionally, the alumni generously donated computers and invested in refurbishing the digital center located in the church, which is part of the Child Development Center.

This initiative reflects Compassion International Kenya's effort towards releasing children from poverty; is a full-circle mission, with the children who have graduated from the program coming back as adults to give back to their community and break the cycle of poverty.

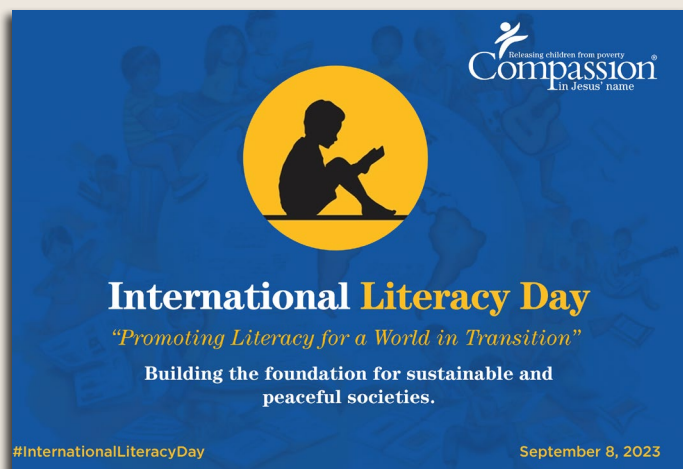
