In Focus

Lessons from The Child Protection Webinar



All children have needs that must be met - a right to safety, protection from harm, love and attention, be heard and recognized, and appropriate upbringing and guidance.

Fortunately, many are beginning to wake up to the reality that our homes, schools, streets are not entirely safe for children. What's finally becoming clear is that child neglect is more common than we think. Even though it transcends borders and cultures and affects millions of people every year, there is no excuse.

Mr Noah Sanganyi, Director National Council for Children Service (NCCS) says,

The first and most paramount responsibility is to **take collective action** against harmful practices and social norms and empower children and youth to recognize, address and prevent acts of abuse.

It is important to note that although children's protection and healthy development depend critically on the capability of their caregivers and families to care and protect, a secure environment and access to child and family support at the community level.

Mrs Bernadette Loloju, CEO Anti Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) Board, adds,

“It is important for a child to be taken care of wholly. Each one of us has a role to play to achieve these outcomes for our children. Ending FGM is the responsibility of everyone, and likewise, to prevent and reduce cases of neglect, it needs to be our shared responsibility”.

In child development programs, we need to foster more meaningful **child inclusivity, participation and child leadership**; it promotes intergenerational relationships. When children are known and heard, it increases the potential of positive outcomes and increases their commitment to making the process work.

Jackqueline Kibosia, Magistrate, Madaraka Courts and Child Protection Officer, says,

“We are no longer just having children participate, we are including them in the decision-making. We are seeking to hear their thoughts and contributions. It makes our child-focused programs more effective”.

Lastly, family is the building block of society and the most natural environment for nurturing the young. It has become increasingly important for policies and programmers to promote, preserve and strengthen the family unit. When children and youth have access to information and education and are in an environment that is safe and promotes their well-being, they thrive.

He attests that Elizabeth is God's gift to him, and he adores and supports her the best way he can.

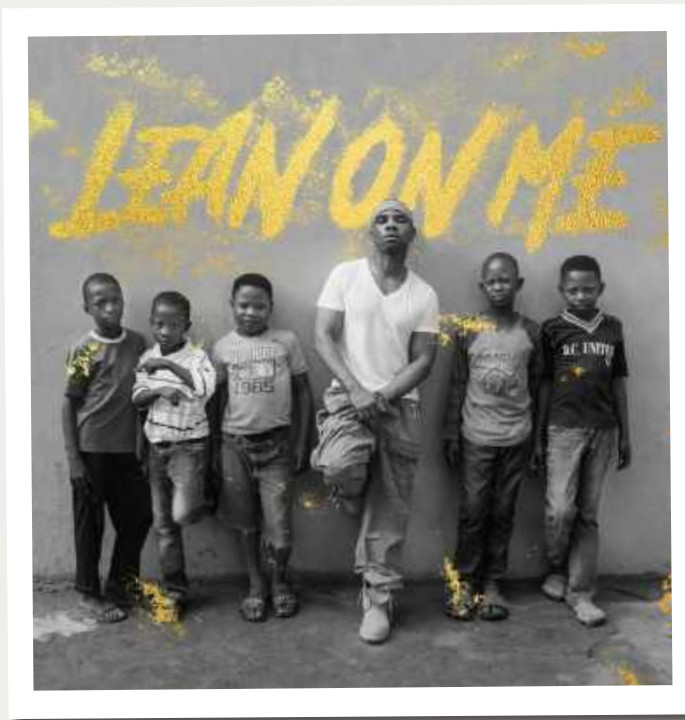

Compassion Youth Choir
